


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#### THE PRESIDENT'S CORNER

#### **NEWS FROM LORD LOTHIAN**

Dear Bob and Margo,

Life here is very confused. This wretched virus is closing us all down step by step. Given my age ... I am classified in the most vulnerable category and slowly and annoyingly my life is being systematically circumscribed. I am now out of London and back in Scotland so that certain parts of my work have just been shut down. I am now effectively isolated and remain at Monteviot, which with the spring coming, is in many ways lovely. My family is cautiously moving in for the duration, which is good, but none of us know for how long this wretched infection is going to be in the ascendency. I fear some months more at least.

You ask some pertinent questions. I am no expert in the origins of family names. The Lord Lyon is probably the best source of information. I think, however, that in the Middle Ages some families took the name of their local community. "Ancrum" was quite a significant community in those times, with a resident Bishop in a palace and the custodianship of one of the main bridges into Scotland, the ruins of which have recently emerged and are currently being explored and evaluated. It is now a sleepy little village but many years ago the name could have carried quite a cachet. This amateur offering is, I fear, the best I can do.

Do let me know of any Kerrs who may be coming over in the summer. Ferniehirst Castle, the Kerr's original keep, should be open (*virus permitting*) and I can arrange a visit. (*My nephew*) Johnnie might even be in residence.

Let me know if Walter Kerr in Australia is well, and pass my salutations to him. Circumstances permitting, I still hope to sometime visit with him Down Under.

#### **GENEALOGIST'S CORNER**

Doing research on your Kerr/Carr background? Among many good sites to visit, you may want to visit these:

"My Heritage" Website: to explore your Kerr family name. At some point you may be asked to pay for information, and for those desperate for a quick avenue to results, it is sometimes easier to consider these alternatives. The "My Heritage" site lists 5,853,101 records for Kerr, along with 371,797 birth, marriage and death records, as well as 251,134 census and voter lists. Also available are data lists for the states of Arkansas, Missouri, Texas, Kentucky, and Ohio. Five individual Kerr family websites are also listed with member totals of 92, 36, 25, 21 and 42, respectively. And if you are interested in popular first names for Kerr here in the States, they are (*in alphabetical order*): Charles, David, George, James, Janet, Margaret, Mary, Robert, Sarah, Thomas and William.

"Kerr (Surnames)" lists hundreds of Kerrs worldwide (*alphabetically by their first name*) along with their date of birth and profession in the United States and around the world.

Our Clan Genealogist asks members to forward information about their famous forefathers for inclusion in future Clan Kerr/Carr Clan newsletters.

#### **ATTENDING HIGHLAND GAMES AS KERR CLAN SPONSOR?**

It's worth looking into! You do not have to be involved in the Games as a Clan. Sponsorships are to help the Games, while giving you and your family added "perks" while in attendance. Most sponsor arrangements include a Sponsor's Reception or Dinner on the Friday evening before the Games. #### **ORIGIN OF THE KERR CLAN TARTAN**



In the last three thousand years, Scotland's Celts have made simple plaid designs with a few basic colors. This remained the case in Scotland until the late 18<sup>th</sup> Century. Prior to this most clansmen identified themselves by the jewelry and pins they wore.

Then ... in 1842, came William Tait of Edenborough, whose

publication entitled, "Vestarium Scoticum," aroused a furor in both Scotland and England.

Tait's book provided colored artwork for 75 Scottish Clan tartan designs: 36 for the Highland Clans, 30 in the Lowlands, and 9 in the Borderlands. Where had Tait's tartan designs and colors come from? No one seemed to know. But never mind! In England it was the beginning of an era of "dandies," where well-dressed fashion-minded upper class were emerging in the British Isles at the time. Tait's "Vestarium Scoticum" became the new fashion rage of English society.





Then another book came out by John Telfar Dunbar entitled, "The History of Scotland's Dress." Dunbar's book labeled Tait's book a complete forgery. All 75 Clan Tartan designs were baseless. However, the new tartan craze was already underway and out of control in England. Today, 170 years later, virtually all of Tait's Clan tartan designs have been adopted by almost all of Scotland's Clans, including the Kerr Clan.




#### THE WEBMASTER'S CORNER

#### FROM THE KERR'S SKUNK WORKS

Kerr members frequently enquire about Scottish traditions.

The "Skunk Works" is intended to provide information for them.

#### Who Were The Kerr "Wardens Of The Marches"?




For 403 years, between 1297 and 1600, Scotland's border areas with England were unstable. To keep order, the English created the "Five Lord Wardens of the Marches," three on the north side of the border and two on the south. Men of prominence on both sides were appointed. Responsible for border security, those on the north side obviously endured many problems with their English counterparts who never considered Scotland much more than a troublesome neighbor ... errant children to be subdued and disciplined. In 1603, Scotland was finally forced to join England when the Crowns of England and Scotland were united under King James. The

"Lords of the Marches" were then terminated.

For the 403 years the Kerrs, in the center of the north side of the border, were prominent in the "Middle March." To the east and west of the Kerrs were other Clans. The Kerrs had problems with many of these Clans. During the 403 years the Marches existed, twenty prominent Clan Kerr representatives served on the north side. Among these were the Kerr, Douglas, Stewart, Home, Scott, Hepburn and Carey. Following are the nine Kerrs who served:

- 1. 1457 1478 Andrew Kerr of Cessford
- 2. 1502 1509 Walter Kerr of Cessford
- 3. 1510 1514 Ralph and Andrew Kerr
- 4. 1514 1514 Sir Robert Ker of Caverton (*killed the same year*)
- 5. 1515 1524 Sir Andrew Kerr of Cessford
- 6. 1541 1549 William Kerr of Cessford (1)
- 7. 1560 1582 Sir Walter Kerr of Cessford
- 8. 1583 1584 William Ker of Cessford
- 9. 1584 1591 Sir Thomas Ker of Ferniehurst
- (1) In 1545, the famous Borderlands Battle at Ancrum Moor took place some five miles north of Ferniehirst Castle, in which a small Scottish army mostly of local Clans, defeated a much larger British Army and forced it to leave Scotland. The whereabouts of William Kerr at this time is being looked into.





#### KERR CASTLES IN THE BORDERLANDS

Historically, there have been two branches of the Kerrs who feuded with one another, as did all the Borderland Clans from time-to-time. The two Kerrs were those of Cessford and those of Ferniehirst. Together the Kerr's had eight castles which Wikipedia listed as follows:



- 1. **Ferniehirst Castle**. Built around 1470, it held the gate to Scotland, commanding the main Borderland road into Scotland. It confronted scores of British challenges.
- 2. **Newbattle Abbey**. Near Edinburgh became a secular Lordship for Mark Kerr, 1<sup>st</sup> Earl of Lothian in 1587.
- 3. Floors Castle. A great monument to the Kerr's success.
- 4. **Roxburgh Castle**. Just across the River Tweed from the Castle.
- 5. Castle Holydean. Destroyed in 1276, and very little now remains.
- 6. **Cessford Castle**. A massive L-plan castle.
- 7. **Nisbet House**. A 17<sup>th</sup> Century tower house configuration.
- 8. **Kersland Castle**. A tower configuration house near Dalry in Ayreshire.



#### KERR/CARR MEDAL OF HONOR WINNERS

Clan Kerr's membership in the Medal of Honor Association presently stands at eight. The earliest was in 1862, and the most recent awards were from World War II. Their ranks included one Brigadier General, one Colonel, one Captain, one Sergeant, two Army Privates, one Corporal, and one Master-at-Arms aboard a Navy ship. The most interesting might be Marine Corps Corporal Louis W. Carr who was cited for repeated acts of bravery throughout July and August of 1900, during the Boxer Rebellion in Peiking, China. #### ORIGIN OF THE CLANS MOTTO AND CREST



The Kerrs were reported to have arrived late at the battle of Ancrum Moor in 1545. Arriving late on the battlefield, the Kerrs saved the day as the sun was setting behind them and in the English faces. Hence ... "The Sun in its Splendor," and "Late but in Earnest" on the Kerr Clan crest!

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#### CLAN KERR AMONG AMERICA'S CLANS

Clan Kerr in the United States is among some one hundred and twenty Scottish Clans. A few Clans are not officially recognized at the moment by the Lord Lyon in England as they have no recognized Chief. Clan Kerr's Chief is Michael Kerr (Lord Lothian). The fact that a Clan does or does not have a recognized Chief does not impact the ability of most to attend Games and celebrate their heritage in America.




#### THE KERR LEADERSHIP IN SCOTLAND

For 417 years, from 1603 to today, 13 prominent Kerrs held various official titles bestowed on them by both Scottish leadership and others in England. Our current Chief, Michael Andrew Jude Kerr, is the 13<sup>th</sup> Marquess of Lothian. Earlier titles borne by our Chief's predecessors across the centuries have been, The Baron of Newbattle, Earl of Lothian, Lord of Jedburgh, Earl of Ancrum, and Duke of Roxburgh. As reported in earlier newsletters, the next Kerr Chief will probably be Johnnie Kerr, who is the son of Lord Lothian's brother, and will bear the title of the 14<sup>th</sup> Marquess of Lothian.

#### FOR KERR/CARR MEMBERS DOING RESEARCH ON THEIR HISTORY ...

As the Clan historian and genealogist, I am often asked to help members with their research. The reality of such an endeavor is that those interested also need to do most of the work, which is a long and frustrating challenge. We here at Clan Kerr try to establish the focal point for others as they begin and pursue their research. Clan Kerr's website for instance (<a href="www.clankerrus.org">www.clankerrus.org</a>), contains five major bullet points entitled "About the Clan." "Heritage Research" contains nine organizations. "Associates" contain another eight. Our "Clan History" and "Newsletters," going back many years, also contain useful research information. And, finally, our "Links" section is also an invaluable reference area.



#### ...AND EVEN DEEPER INTO KERR HISTORY




Ellen Woodrow, one of our California Kerr members, is researching unique and seldom researched Scottish connections into the fog of history. In the four-hundred years between the 6<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> Centuries, Norwegian and Swedish Vikings involved in raids in Scotland, also explored the backwoods of the world, across the seas and through the river systems of Europe. Along the Atlantic, they challenged existing civilizations, while eastward they sought new domains in Russia, the Mediterranean and Asia.

Their traces have recently been found as far east as China, where well-preserved mummies are

appearing in the Taklaggmakan Dessert. Tall in stature, wearing wool tartan materials, the bodies have braided blond and red hair, European features, and European dental similarities. Even their graves are in boat-shaped enclosures with painted oars with tartan materials, felt boots and hats. Archaeologists are perplexed as they are also encountering linguistic questions. The Gaelic word for "mead" is the Chinese word for "honey." Taklagg, the name of the local desert there, is the Swedish word for "roof," and many today call the remote Taklagg area, "The Roof of the World."






#### **ORIGINS OF THE NAME KERR**

#### Take your pick!

Earlier newsletters have explored the arrival of the Vikings around England and their Swedish word for "Sharr," which is pronounced "Karr." Historians and others in the fog of history have attempted to explain other origins of the name according to ancient dictionaries, languages, dialects, and derivatives. For example: "Caer" for a fort, "Ciar" for dusky, "Cearr" for left-handed, "Kjarr" for a marsh dweller, "Curr" slang for a dog in English, and even "Krr" in Hattic which means dignity. The only important thing for all of us today is to be consistent with the modern pronunciation which is "Carr/Karr," while the most accepted spelling is still "Kerr."

#### Who Was Patrick Carr?

Members of Clan Kerr here in the United States, were completely taken by surprise last week when their local newspaper revealed that five Colonists were killed in the first volley of British musket fire by the Redcoats. They were unarmed Americans protesting against various British injustices. Known today as the "Boston Massacre" of March 5, 1770, Patrick Carr was among the five dead. Others killed that day were James Caldwell, Samuel Gray, Samuel Maverick and Crispus Attucks, the first Black American to lose his life in the American Revolution.




Clan Kerr/Carr members should review their genealogies to see if there was a Patrick Carr in their line who lived in Boston in 1770, with the same date of death. It would be a fascinating family record. The image above was a published photo of their tombstone commemorating their sacrifice.

Due to the large number of these events, future editions of *Teviotdale Herald* will address specific battles, which are most often mentioned in Scottish history.



#### KERR'S SCOTTISH TEMPLARS AND THE CRUSADES

Research is now underway by Clan Kerr in the United States, to seek the identities of Kerr Knights Templar who left Scotland to fight in the five Crusades during the 175 years between 1096 and 1271. It is now known that significant numbers of Scotlish Clansmen (by the thousands), from south and central Scotland, took the Cross and went to the Holy Land to defend Christianity.

A search has now begun to find out more about those involved. For example, 2 Stewart Knights are known to have served with Richard the Lionheart at the famous battle with Saladin at Marsuf, near what is today known as Gaza. Other Stewarts served in the Crusader's Egyptian campaign. Kerrs were there! We intend to look into who, when and where.
